








the United States, and thus offer unique teaching

- Since the program's inception in 1999 the number of BLM HOL sites has grown from 2 to 52. Creating a vibrant network of sites and programs.
- The best HOL sites deliver high-quality, sustained educational programming that introduces students to resource management issues.
- Enhancing the quality of programming at existing sites
- Improving networking among HOL sites
- Increasing participation: Hands on the Land will become the standard for quality education in the BLM.





Volunteer hours associated with HOL sites exceeded 31,000 hours or the equivalent of 10 years and 2 months of 8 hour workdays without stopping for weekends and holidays. Volunteers contribute their time, services and skills to a wide variety of educational efforts.



Financial and in-kind contributions to the BLM's HOL sites totaled nearly \$630,000.



The number of BLM HOL sites increased from 38 to 49 in FY2012 a 28 % increase in the number of sites: including new sites in Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona, Utah, California, and Montana.

- BLM's HOL Program hosted 1,131 days of outdoor classroom activities- that's more than 3 years in one made possible by multiple programs at multiple sites over the course of 2012.
- Engaged over 50,000 students, teachers and parents in 2012. That's slightly more than the student populations of Howard University, the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Yale University, Seton Hall University and Loyola Marymount University- combined!

BLM Idaho's F.I.R.E. Up HOL program completed its ninth year. Among many projects, students camped out for three days to work in and around **BLM's new Jacks Creek** Wilderness area. Students gathered baseline data for basal gap and canopy gap in the new wilderness area. Providing a foundation for comparative management studies for wind and water erosion in years to come.






At the Campbell Creek Science Center in Anchorage Alaska more than 10,000 students participated in hands on science and exploration over 117 days of HOL programming – an average of 85 students a day.

Working with Community Partners

In partnership with the **Fastern Sierra Institute for** Collaborative Education (ESICE), the Fish Slough HOL Site gave all 2nd and 4th grade students in the Owens Valley the opportunity to participate in field trips to Fish Slough, a rare desert wetland and designated Area of Critical **Environmental Concern** (ACEC).



Working with Community Partners



Canyonlands Field Institute and the Moab Field Office hosted nearly 1000 students, from as far away as Florida and Oregon, at the Professor Valley Field Camp and on guided trips down the Colorado River.
